Dear Mr. Zamani:

This letter is to inform you that the Office of Defects Investigation (ODI) of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) has opened a Preliminary Evaluation (PE11-002) to investigate fuel leaks on certain Sterling trucks manufactured by Daimler Trucks North America and to request certain information. This investigation is being opened based on a Vehicle Owner's Questionnaire (VOQ) as well as fleet experiences reported to ODI. A copy of the VOQ is enclosed for your review.

Unless otherwise stated in the text, the following definitions apply to these information requests:

- **Subject vehicle:** All 2005-2007 Sterling L-liner tractors equipped with a MBE4000 engine and configured as an automobile hauler manufactured by Daimler Trucks North America for sale or lease in the United States.
- **Subject component:** Engine low pressure fuel lines
- **Manufacturer:** Daimler Trucks North America (Sterling), all of its past and present officers and employees, whether assigned to its principal offices or any of its field or other locations, including all of its divisions, subsidiaries (whether or not incorporated) and affiliated enterprises and all of their headquarters, regional, zone and other offices and their employees, and all agents, contractors, consultants, attorneys and law firms and other persons engaged directly or indirectly (e.g., employee of a consultant) by or under the control of Sterling (including all business units and persons previously referred to), who are or, in or after 2003, were involved in any way with any of the following related to the alleged defect in the subject vehicles:
 - a. Design, engineering, analysis, modification or production (e.g. quality control);
 - b. Testing, assessment or evaluation;

- c. Consideration, or recognition of potential or actual defects, reporting, record-keeping and information management, (e.g., complaints, field reports, warranty information, part sales), analysis, claims, or lawsuits; or
 - d. Communication to, from or intended for zone representatives, fleets, dealers, or other field locations, including but not limited to people who have the capacity to obtain information from dealers.
- **Alleged defect:** Any failure of the low pressure fuel lines on the MBE4000 engine that resulted in a loss of fuel.
 - **Document:** "Document(s)" is used in the broadest sense of the word and shall mean all original written, printed, typed, recorded, or graphic matter whatsoever, however produced or reproduced, of every kind, nature, and description, and all non-identical copies of both sides thereof, including, but not limited to, papers, letters, memoranda, correspondence, communications, electronic mail (e-mail) messages (existing in hard copy and/or in electronic storage), faxes, mailgrams, telegrams, cables, telex messages, notes, annotations, working papers, drafts, minutes, records, audio and video recordings, data, databases, other information bases, summaries, charts, tables, graphics, other visual displays, photographs, statements, interviews, opinions, reports, newspaper articles, studies, analyses, evaluations, interpretations, contracts, agreements, jottings, agendas, bulletins, notices, announcements, instructions, blueprints, drawings, as-builts, changes, manuals, publications, work schedules, journals, statistical data, desk, portable and computer calendars, appointment books, diaries, travel reports, lists, tabulations, computer printouts, data processing program libraries, data processing inputs and outputs, microfilms, microfiches, statements for services, resolutions, financial statements, governmental records, business records, personnel records, work orders, pleadings, discovery in any form, affidavits, motions, responses to discovery, all transcripts, administrative filings and all mechanical, magnetic, photographic and electronic records or recordings of any kind, including any storage media associated with computers, including, but not limited to, information on hard drives, floppy disks, backup tapes, and zip drives, electronic communications, including but not limited to, the Internet and shall include any drafts or revisions pertaining to any of the foregoing, all other things similar to any of the foregoing, however denominated by Sterling, any other data compilations from which information can be obtained, translated if necessary, into a usable form and any other documents. For purposes of this request, any document which contains any note, comment, addition, deletion, insertion, annotation, or otherwise comprises a non-identical copy of another document shall be treated as a separate document subject to production. In all cases where original and any non-identical copies are not available, "document(s)" also means any identical copies of the original and all non-identical copies thereof. Any document, record, graph, chart, film or photograph originally produced in color must be provided in color. Furnish all documents whether verified by the manufacturer or not. If a document is not in the English language, provide both the original document and an English translation of the document.
 - **Other Terms:** To the extent that they are used in these information requests, the terms "claim," "consumer complaint," "dealer field report," "field report," "fire," "fleet," "good

will," "make," "model," "model year," "notice," "property damage," "property damage claim," "rollover," "type," "warranty," "warranty adjustment," and "warranty claim," whether used in singular or in plural form, have the same meaning as found in 49 CFR 579.4.

In order for my staff to evaluate the alleged defect, certain information is required. Pursuant to 49 U.S.C. § 30166, please provide numbered responses to the following information requests. Insofar as Sterling has previously provided a document to ODI, Sterling may produce it again or identify the document, the document submission to ODI in which it was included and the precise location in that submission where the document is located. When documents are produced, the documents shall be produced in an identified, organized manner that corresponds with the organization of this information request letter (including all individual requests and subparts). When documents are produced and the documents would not, standing alone, be self-explanatory, the production of documents shall be supplemented and accompanied by explanation.

Please repeat the applicable request verbatim above each response. After Sterling's response to each request, identify the source of the information and indicate the last date the information was gathered.

1. State, by model and model year, how many units of the subject vehicles Sterling has manufactured for sale or lease in the United States. For each vehicle provide the following:
 - a. VIN;
 - b. Make;
 - c. Model;
 - d. Model Year;
 - e. Upper low pressure fuel line part number (ex. A460 090 3676)
 - f. Lower low pressure fuel line part number (ex. A460 090 3776)
 - g. Date of manufacture; and
 - h. Date warranty coverage commenced.

Provide the table in Excel or a compatible format, entitled "PRODUCTION DATA." See Enclosure 1, Data Collection Disc, for a pre-formatted table that provides further details regarding this submission.

2. State the number and provide copies of each of the following, received by Sterling, which relate to, or may relate to, the alleged defect in the subject vehicles:
 - a. Consumer / fleet complaints;
 - b. Field reports;
 - c. Reports involving a crash, injury, or fatality;
 - d. Reports involving a fire;
 - e. Property damage claims;
 - f. Third-party arbitration proceedings where Sterling is or was a party to the arbitration; and
 - g. Lawsuits, both pending and closed, in which Sterling is or was a defendant or codefendant.

For subparts "a" through "g," state the total number of each item (e.g., consumer complaints, field reports, etc.) separately. Multiple incidents involving the same unit are to be counted separately. Multiple reports of the same incident are also to be counted separately (i.e., a consumer complaint and a field report involving the same incident in which a crash occurred are to be counted as a crash report, a field report and a consumer complaint). For "f" and "g," provide a summary of the event.

3. Separately, for each item (complaint, report, claim, notice, or matter) within the scope of your response to Request No. 2, state the following information:
 - a. VIN;
 - b. Vehicle's owner or fleet name (and fleet contact person), address, and telephone number;
 - c. Vehicle's model and model year;
 - d. Vehicle's hours/mileage at time of incident, if known;
 - e. Incident date;
 - f. Date of manufacture; and
 - g. Date warranty coverage commenced.

Provide this information in Excel or a compatible format, entitled "REQUEST NUMBER TWO DATA." See Enclosure 1, Data Collection Disc, for a pre-formatted table that provides further details regarding this submission.

4. State, by make, model, and model year, a total count for all of the following categories of claims, collectively, that have been paid by Sterling to date that relate to, or may relate to, the alleged defect in the subject vehicles: warranty claims; extended warranty claims; claims for good will services that were provided; field, zone, or similar adjustments and reimbursements; and warranty claims or repairs made in accordance with a procedure specified in a technical service bulletin or customer satisfaction campaign.

Separately, for each such claim, state the following information:

- a. Sterling's claim number;
- b. VIN;
- c. Vehicle's owner or fleet name (and fleet contact person) and telephone number;
- d. Vehicle's make, model, and model year;
- e. Vehicle's build date;
- f. Warranty start date;
- g. Incident date;
- h. Vehicle's hours/mileage at time of repair;
- i. Repairing facility's name, telephone number, and address;
- j. Labor operation number;
- k. Problem code;
- l. Replacement part number(s) and description(s);
- m. Concern stated by customer; and
- n. Comment, if any, by dealer/technician relating to claim and/or repair.

Provide this information in Excel or a compatible format, entitled "WARRANTY DATA." See Enclosure 1, Data Collection Disc, for a pre-formatted table that provides further details regarding this submission.

5. Provide copies of any service or technical bulletins, product improvement campaign announcements, or advisories, and all other communications concerning the alleged defect that Sterling has issued or is considering issuing to fleets, dealers, zone offices, or field offices. If Sterling has drafted any such communications, furnish a copy of the draft. For any such communication that has been issued, identify, by name, address, telephone number, and contact person, each entity to which it was sent, the date on which the communication was sent, and the specific equipment to which the communication pertained. For each such communication:
 - a. Provide a complete chronology, listing all activities or events, including, but not limited to, incidents, which led Sterling to issue the communication;
 - b. Provide a listing (in chronological order) of all testing through which the need for the communication was identified and/or assessed, even if the testing was being conducted for another purpose. Please provide a copy of all relevant information from each test listed; and
 - c. State the number of repairs and/or replacements paid for by Sterling that resulted from the communication identified. List your response by repairing dealer (and include the dealer's name, address, and telephone number).
6. Provide a detailed chronology of all events regarding the alleged defect starting from the time Sterling first became aware of this issue to present. Describe how Sterling first became aware of the alleged defect and state the date on which Sterling first became aware of the possibility of the alleged defect. Include all information including dates of both internal and external meetings, meetings with fleets, manufacturers, or any others involved in this issue and discuss the resolution, planned action, and/or the manner in which Sterling plans to address this issue. Also separately, provide a copy of any/all document(s) and presentation materials that were used during the meeting(s) whether Sterling generated the document(s) or the document(s) were generated by others.
7. Describe all modifications or changes made by, or on behalf of, Sterling in the design, material composition, manufacture, quality control, supply, or installation of the subject component, from the start of production to date, which relate to, or may relate to, the alleged defect in the subject vehicle. For each such modification or change, provide the following information:
 - a. The date on which the change was incorporated into production;
 - b. A detailed description of the change;
 - c. The reason(s) for the change;
 - d. The part numbers (service and engineering) of the original component;
 - e. The part number (service and engineering) of the modified component;
 - f. Whether the original unmodified component was withdrawn from production, inventory(s) and/or sale, and if so, when;

- g. When the modified component was made available as a service component; and
 - h. Whether the modified component can be interchanged with earlier production components.
8. State the number of each of the following that Sterling has sold that may be used on the subject vehicles by component name, part number (both service and engineering/production), make, model and model year of the subject vehicle in which it is used and month/year of sale (including the cut-off date for sales, if applicable):
- a. Subject component identified by manufacturer and part number; and
 - b. Any kits that have been released, or developed, by Sterling for use in service repairs to the subject component/assembly also by manufacturer and part number.

For each component part number, provide the supplier's name, address, and appropriate point of contact (name, title, and telephone number). Also identify by make, model and model year, any other vehicles of which Sterling is aware that contain the identical component, whether installed in production or in service, and state the applicable dates of production or service usage.

9. Provide a full description and copies of the maintenance and inspection requirements furnished by Sterling or on Sterling's behalf to owners and lessees that relate or may relate to the alleged defect in the subject vehicle.
10. Furnish Sterling's assessment of the alleged defect in the subject vehicle, including:
- a. The causal or contributory factor(s);
 - b. The failure mechanism(s);
 - c. The failure mode(s);
 - d. The risk to motor vehicle safety that it poses; and
 - e. What warnings, if any, the operator and other people both inside and outside the vehicle would have that the alleged defect had occurred?

This letter is being sent to Sterling pursuant to 49 U.S.C. § 30166, which authorizes NHTSA to conduct any investigation that may be necessary to enforce Chapter 301 of Title 49 and to request reports and the production of things. It constitutes a new request for information. Sterling's failure to respond promptly and fully to this letter could subject Sterling to civil penalties pursuant to 49 U.S.C. § 30165 or lead to an action for injunctive relief pursuant to 49 U.S.C. § 30163. (Other remedies and sanctions are available as well.) Please note that maximum civil penalties under 49 U.S.C. § 30165 have increased as a result of the enactment of the Transportation Recall Enhancement, Accountability, and Documentation (TREAD) Act, Public Law No. 106-414 (signed November 1, 2000). Section 5(a) of the TREAD Act, codified at 49 U.S.C. § 30165(b), provides for civil penalties of up to \$6,000 per day, with a maximum of \$16,375,000 for a related series of violations, for failing or refusing to perform an act required under 49 U.S.C. § 30166. See 49 CFR 578.6 (as amended by 71 Fed. Reg. 28279 (May 16, 2006)). This includes failing to respond to ODI information requests.

If Sterling cannot respond to any specific request or subpart(s) thereof, please state the reason why it is unable to do so. If on the basis of attorney-client, attorney work product, or other privilege, Sterling does not submit one or more requested documents or items of information in response to this information request, Sterling must provide a privilege log identifying each document or item withheld, and stating the date, subject or title, the name and position of the person(s) from, and the person(s) to whom it was sent, and the name and position of any other recipient (to include all carbon copies or blind carbon copies), the nature of that information or material, and the basis for the claim of privilege and why that privilege applies.

Sterling's response to this letter, in duplicate, together with a copy of any confidentiality request, must be submitted to this office by **March 2, 2011**. All business confidential information must be submitted directly to the Office of Chief Counsel as described in the following paragraph and should not be sent to this office. In addition, do not submit any business confidential information in the body of the letter submitted to this office. Please refer to PE11-002 in Sterling's response to this letter and in any confidentiality request submitted to the Office of Chief Counsel. If Sterling finds that it is unable to provide all of the information requested within the time allotted, Sterling must request an extension from me at (202) 366-6938 no later than five business days before the response due date. If Sterling is unable to provide all of the information requested by the original deadline, it must submit a partial response by the original deadline with whatever information Sterling then has available, even if an extension has been granted.

If Sterling claims that any of the information or documents provided in response to this information request constitute confidential commercial material within the meaning of 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(4), or are protected from disclosure pursuant to 18 U.S.C. § 1905, Sterling must submit supporting information together with the materials that are the subject of the confidentiality request, in accordance with 49 CFR Part 512, as amended, to the Office of Chief Counsel (NCC-111), National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, Room W41-227, 1200 New Jersey Avenue, S.E., Washington, D.C. 20590. Sterling is required to submit two copies of the documents containing allegedly confidential information (except only one copy of blueprints) and one copy of the documents from which information claimed to be confidential has been deleted. Please remember that the word "CONFIDENTIAL BUSINESS INFORMATION" must appear at the top of each page containing information claimed to be confidential, and the information must be clearly identified in accordance with 5 U.S.C. § 512.6. If you submit a request for confidentiality for all or part of your response to this IR, that is in an electronic format (e.g., CD-ROM), your request and associated submission must conform to the new requirements in NHTSA's Confidential Business Information Rule regarding submissions in electronic formats (49 CFR 512.6(c)). See Federal Register, volume 72, page 59434 (October 19, 2007).
